Secure guns in homes and vehicles

- 13 million households with children contain at least one gun
- One study found that the majority of children in gun-owning households knew where the gun was stored
- Store guns locked up and inaccessible to kids
- Hiding a gun is not “securing” a gun



Full-Size Gun Safe

Storage of multiple guns in one place.
Biometric lock more secure than key
or passcode.

\$200-\$2,000

Prevents access by children
Prevents access by unauthorized users
Prevents theft (if secured to a structure in home)
Enables fast access



Lock Box/Locker

Smaller and lighter than safe.
Biometric lock more secure than key
or passcode.

\$25-\$350

Prevents access by children
Prevents access by unauthorized users
Provides secure vehicle storage
Enables fast access



Console/Vehicle Gun Safe

For storage in a vehicle. Biometric lock
more secure than key or passcode.

\$50-\$350

Prevents access by children
Prevents access by unauthorized users
Prevents theft (if secured to a structure in car)
Provides secure vehicle storage
Enables fast access



Gun Case

For home or in-transit storage of one firearm. Uses external lock

\$10-\$150

Prevents access by children
Prevents access by unauthorized users
Enables fast access



Trigger Lock

Locks trigger of single weapon. Never use with loaded gun. May be dismantled with minimal tools and skills, so not as effective with older children and teens.

\$10-\$75

Prevents use by small children
Enables fast access



Cable Lock

Cable runs through action of single weapon to prevent firing. Ammunition must be removed for lock use. May be dismantled with minimal tools and skills, so not as effective with older children and teens.

\$0-\$50

Prevents use by small children
Enables fast access
*Often provided free with firearm purchase.



Model Responsible Behavior


- It is always an adult's responsibility to prevent unauthorized access to guns, not a curious child's responsibility to avoid guns
- Make it a part of the normal safety conversation you have with your children
- Keep the language simple; for example: "If you see a gun, don't touch it. Tell an adult right away."



Ask About Unsecured Guns in Other Homes

- Make it a part of your general safety conversation you have when sending your child to any home
- Try email or text
- 4.6 million U.S. children live in a household with at least one loaded, unlocked gun



Recognize the Role of Guns in Suicide

- Most people who attempt suicide do not die—unless they use a gun
- 90% of suicide attempts with a gun result in death—a much higher fatality rate than any other means of self harm
- This contributes to the fact that 41 percent of child suicides involve a gun

A survey of High School students found that 20% had seriously considered attempting suicide within the last year.

And one study showed that 41% of adolescents in gun-owning households report having “easy-access” to the guns in their home.

- 88th Legislative Session

Safe Firearm Storage Resources

*Information for School Districts and Open-Enrollment Charter Schools to
Assist with New Legislative Requirements*

[House Bill 3](#), Section 19 (88th Texas Legislature) requires the Texas School Safety Center, in collaboration with the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), to provide to each school district and open-enrollment charter school information and other resources regarding the safe storage of firearms, including information on section [46.13 of the Texas Penal Code](#), for distribution by the district or school.

The Texas DPS has created a public relations campaign – [Keep 'Em Safe Texas](#) – that offers free downloadable resources to promote safe gun storage.

Districts must provide this information to the parent or guardian of each student enrolled in the district or school. The Texas School Safety Center recommends districts provide this information multiple times annually—at the beginning of the school year, before holidays and breaks, and at the end of the school year.

SAFE STORAGE OF FIREARMS

We want to inform you about an important initiative regarding firearm safety that is a part of Fort Bend ISD's ongoing commitment to the safety and well-being of our students.

In accordance with Sec. 37.222 of the Texas Education Code, school districts are now required to inform parents and guardians about the safe storage of firearms.

It is illegal to store, transport, or leave an unsecured firearm in a location where children are likely to have access to it. Under **Texas Penal Code 46.13**, a person commits the offense of making a firearm accessible to a child if the child gains access to a readily dischargeable firearm, and the person with criminal negligence:

- Failed to secure the firearm; or
- Left the firearm in a place to which the person knew or should have known the child would gain access

The penalty for allowing a child access to a firearm can range from a Class C misdemeanor (punishable by a \$500 fine) to a Class A misdemeanor (punishable by a \$4,000 fine, a year in jail, or a combination of the two).

It is important to store guns unloaded in a safe or locked container, with ammunition stored separately to prevent suicide, unintentional shootings and other tragedies. Texas exempts the purchase of firearm safety equipment from **Texas Sales and Use Tax**.

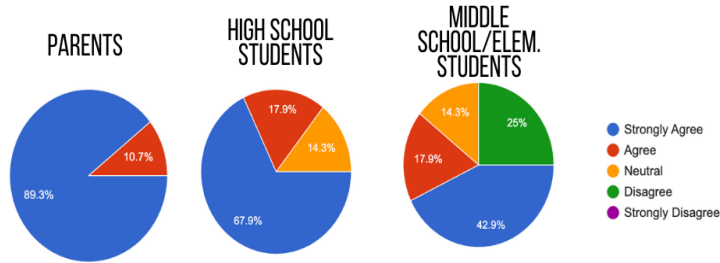

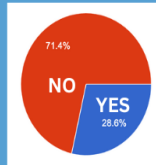

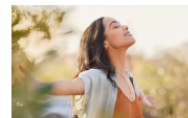

This sound bite will remind us of what we need to focus on and what we need to release, especially when we feel like the weight of the world is on our shoulders.



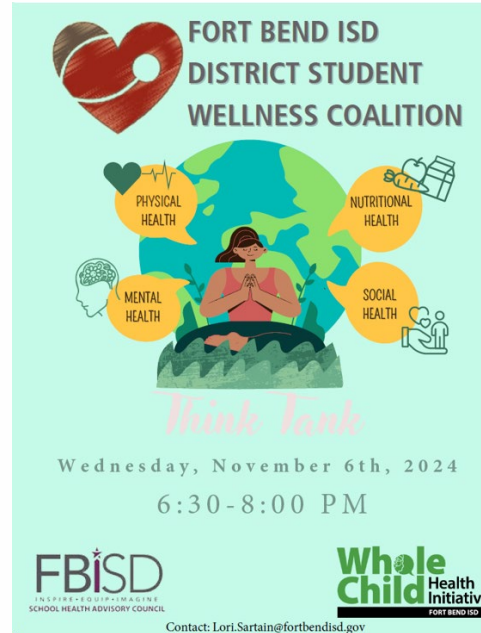

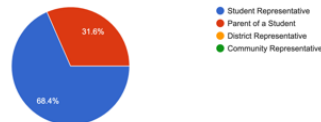
What are your thoughts about counselor accessibility when it comes to mental health?

- They don't really talk about it

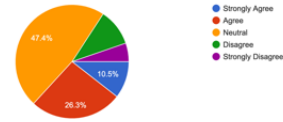
Are there any issues with access to Mental Health specific to your campus?

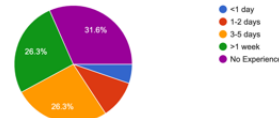

How can we increase exposure to the services that are available?

- Promote services in morning announcements. Suggest showing sound bites in morning announcements or during advisory time.
- Having to see the counselor at least once a month. We have QR codes to access information, but we don't have our phones.
- Expand to platforms like TikTok and Instagram reels. Posting short-form content on social media to raise awareness of mental health and services.
- Make sure students are a priority to counselors
- Parent newsletters
- Students should be reminded regularly that they can go to a teacher or counselor for any mental health concerns.

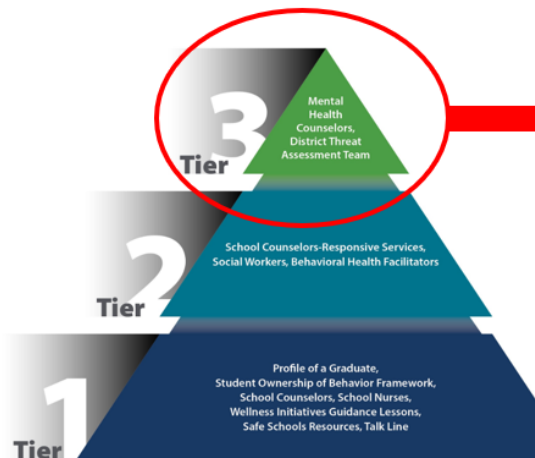
What are some things you think you can do to bring back to your campus/child/community?

- **Have conversations about mental health.** Conversations can happen between students and resources should be made more public. Bring up mental health topics and open up serious issues for discussion.
- We can emphasize mental health resource accessibility through announcements and videos, posters, activities, etc. Brain-break from Shac, found out big games are now at campus.
- Make TikTok videos, Instagram reels
- Mental health tips like how to deal with test anxiety etc.
