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# What is Financial Aid?

- Financial aid is any money that helps your student pay for college, trade school or certification programs
  - Scholarships and grants: your student doesn't have to pay it back
  - Loans: your student has to pay it back
- How does your student get financial aid?
  - Apply for campus scholarships
    - Available through college campus portal login
  - Apply for non-campus scholarships
    - Listed in SchoolLinks, Studentscholarships.org, etc.
  - Complete the FAFSA or TASFA





# Financial Aid Graduation Requirement

- All Texas graduates have to show completion of the FAFSA or TASFA in order to receive a diploma
  - Students seeking military service or workforce options should opt out
- Students need to submit proof for verification in SchoolLinks by Monday, February 3
  - More info to come on a later slide
- US citizens fill out the FAFSA
- Non-US citizens (but who are going to a Texas school and have lived here for more than three years) fill out the TASFA





Everything is an acronym...

- FAFSA: Free Application for Federal Student Aid
- TASFA: Texas Application for State Financial Aid





# Which one do I fill out? **FAFSA**

- You and your student will fill out the **FAFSA** if you answer YES to any of the following questions. Is your student a:
  - U.S. citizen?
  - U.S. National?
  - A permanent U.S. resident with an I-551 or I-151 visa?
  - A conditional permanent U.S. resident with an I-94 visa?
  - An eligible noncitizen with Arrival/Departure Record (I-94 visa)?
  - An eligible noncitizen with T non-immigrant status (T-visa)?
  - An eligible noncitizen whose parent holds a T-1 non-immigrant status?





# Which one do I fill out? **TASFA**

- Your student will fill out the **TASFA** if you answer NO to any of the questions on the previous slide but YES if your student:
  - Have resided in Texas for 12 months prior to the enrollment in a higher education institution; AND
  - Have or will graduate from a Texas High School or obtain a GED in Texas; AND
  - Have lived in Texas for 36 months prior to high school graduation





# Your FAFSA: Create Your FSA ID

- **Step 1: Create your FSA ID**
- Both the student and parents/guardians should each have an FSA ID
  - If parents file taxes jointly, just one FSA ID is needed
  - If parents file separately, they both need one
- Go to [studentaid.gov](https://studentaid.gov) to create yours
  - Students will need their social security number to create theirs
  - Parents without a SS# can still complete the FAFSA
  - If parents already have an FSA ID from an older child, they do not have to create a new one
- It will take about three days for the account to be approved by the US Department of Education





# Your FAFSA: Filling it Out

- **Step 2: Students and parents both complete their sections of the FAFSA**
- Students will follow the prompts and fill out as much as they can
  - This includes personal information and which school(s) they will be applying to (trade schools, colleges and universities)
  - Students will invite their parent to add their information; they will need their parent's name, DOB, SSN and email address used to create their own FSA ID
- Parents will fill in their financial information from their 2023 tax return using their own FSA ID
  - Student invitation will be in My Activity (profile)
  - None of your financial information will be seen by RPHS or FBISD





# Your FAFSA: Verifying Information

- **Step 3: Verifying your status**
- After both parties have submitted, students need to log in daily to ensure that there is no missing information, such as a signature
- Once the FAFSA application is approved, students will receive an email
- It will contain the completion date, Data Release Number and Estimated Student Aid Index (SAI)
  - The SAI is a formula that helps colleges determine student financial aid amounts, ranging from -1500 to 999999

*The estimated SAI is **subject to change** based on final processing of your FAFSA form. The SAI is **not** a measure of how much student aid you'll receive or how much you'll pay for college or career school. Schools use your SAI to determine your federal student aid eligibility.*

Based on the eligibility criteria, you may be eligible for a Federal Pell Grant of up to \$740.00. You may also be eligible for other federal, state, or institutional grants; scholarships; and/or work-study programs.

# Your TAFSA: Create your Account

- **Step 1:** Create your TASFA account
  - For the online version, create one account for the student, one for the parent. The online version is only available in English
  - You should immediately be able to begin completing the form without a waiting period, unlike the FAFSA

# Your TAFSA: Complete the Form

- **Step 2: Complete the form**
- Like the FAFSA, both parties need to complete the online form
  - If you use the paper form, you just need one
  - The Spanish and English paper versions are available on the TAFSA website (QR code on previous slide)
- You will list which school(s) you want your information sent to
- Once you submit, your information will go to your schools
  - Verify receipt with your school's financial aid office
- You will take a screen shot of your confirmation email and upload that to SchoolLinks





# Opting Out of Financial Aid Forms

- **Step 1: Log in to SchoolLinks**
- Go to Finances/College Finances/Update FAFSA Status
- Click on Won't File
- Download the FAFSA Waiver, sign it and re-upload it in the same spot
- Students can also get a hard copy from Mrs. J in K145 or download from my website
  - If students are 18, they can complete the form themselves


- FAFSA: Students should check their email or studentaid.org account for a screen similar to this one
- TASFA: Students should check their email for a confirmation message and take a screen shot
